For the upcoming club picnic, Bob will call Bob Walhberg to try to reserve the Lake Wilderness arboretum for the 2nd weekend in August. Rich will check on reserving a room for the Christmas dinner and meeting.

Due to the threat of snow over the passes, there was no quorum at the last Mineral Council meeting. The 2017 field trips as likely final. There is still an issue on what the BLM is doing in Utah regarding casual rockhounding. In many states, including Washington, there is a misunderstanding as to what casual rockhounding is. The next CMS field trip in April 15 for carnelian at Salmon Creek.

For the 2018 CMS rock and gem show, most vendors want the last weekend in Sept. Mark will request a cost estimate from Green River CC for that weekend. Club participation at the Gem Faire was canceled due to insufficient volunteers. The Puyallup club participated and sold raffle tickets to their June show. There will be 5 quality prizes that generated \$600 in sales the first day of the Gem Faire.

For the 1st Quarter 2017 club volunteer of the year award the board unanimously voted for Keith Morgan. For the upcoming NFMS show the Board approved donating 1 bucket of rocks for the silent auction and 1 high end piece for the raffle. Also decided was to sell surplus club equipment and other rocks in addition to buckets of rocks at the Puyallup show. The Board and all members are requested to begin tumbling rocks to hand out to children at the Puyallup Fair in September. This year they are looking for rocks 1 to 2 inches in size.

Goldstone

Goldstone is a type of glass made with copper or copper salts in the presence of a reducing flame. Under normal oxidative conditions, copper ions meld to into the silica to produce transparent bluish-green glass; when the reduced Goldstone melt cools, the copper remains in atomic isolation and precipitates into small crystalline clusters.

The most common form of Goldstone gives the illusion of being reddish-brown, though in fact that color comes from the copper crystals and glass it-self is colorless. Some Goldstone variants have an intensely colored glass matrix...usually blue or violet, more rarely green.

The manufacturing process of Goldstone was discovered in the seventeenth century Venice by the Miotti family, which was granted an exclusive license by the Doge.

The Andamooka Opal is a famous opal which was presented to Queen Elizabeth II in 1954 on the occasion of her first visit to South Australia. It was discovered in Andamooka, South Australia, an historic opal mining town.

Blue Jade

In 2012 a 400+ kilo (880 pounds) blue jadeite boulder was pulled out of Clear Creek, CA. In 2013 another 500 pound blue was recovered in the same claim in Clear Creek. The owner of both is a commercial jade miner named Sam Gitchel. Blue jade slabs currently sell on the Internet for around \$400 a pound. What these monsters will sell for (or already have sold for) is most likely a tightly held secret.

Blue jade also comes in the form of the other jade, nephrite. It is often named Pacific Jade or Vonsen Blue Nephrite. The name Vonsen came from the blue nephrite found on the Vonsen Ranch which was one of the first nephrite jade finds found in California. The ranch owner, Magnus Vonsen, just happened be a mineral collector and mineralogist, as well as a shrewd business man. Whether or not he had anything to do with the discovery of the blue nephrite on his ranch; I couldn't find it.

The jade found on the ranch near Petaluma, CA is said to be depleted now but there are some pieces for sale that are claimed to have come from the ranch. Now and then some is also found in Jade Cove. It appears that any blue jade is likely going to be called Vonsen Jade no matter where it comes from or rather it is nephrite or jadeite. It is just a matter of different physical and chemical characteristics.

A New Way to Produce Optically Pure Garnets by Jim Brace-Thompson

Science magazine has reported new high-pressure, high-temperature techniques to synthetically create garnets that are both exceptionally hard and clear. By changing the chemical composition on different batches, they also created a variety of lovely colors, include emerald green and (for Diane Cook) hot pink. According to the report, "the high-quality garnet samples owe their exceptional properties to being nanopolycrystalline." Easy for scientists to say! Their hope is that the new techniques they've developed will one day aid in development of a new generation of ceramics for use in optical devices.
